



Rev's Words:

Even in the midst of the struggle of this "seemingly" never ending distant and disjointed experience of an ongoing pandemic - God is close, right?

As our lives continue to seem distant and disjointed. We really do need to truly hold to another realty: God is always close even in this chaotic time.

Consider this story from scripture..

"And the word of the LORD came to [Elijah]: 'What are you doing here, Elijah?' He replied, 'I have been very zealous for the LORD God Almighty. The Israelites have rejected your covenant, torn down your altars, and put your prophets to death with the sword. I am the only one left, and now they are trying to kill me too.' The LORD said, 'Go out and stand on the mountain in the presence of the LORD, for the LORD is about to pass by.'

Then a great and powerful wind tore the mountains apart and shattered the rocks before the LORD, but the LORD was not in the wind. After the wind there was an earthquake, but the LORD was not in the earthquake. After the earthquake came a fire, but the LORD was not in the fire. And after the fire came a **gentle whisper**. When Elijah heard it, he pulled his cloak over his face and went out and stood at the mouth of the cave. Then a voice said to him, 'What are you doing here, Elijah?'" (1 Kings 19, NIV).

We are living through a period of deep disruption, chaos and anxiety. The things and people we hold most dear have been separated from us. The normal order of life has been utterly upended. The prophet Elijah was in a similar place. Rejected by his people, chased by his government, he was the last prophet in the land of Israel. Lonely and afraid, disconnected and heartbroken, Elijah waits for God.

God does not arrive in wind. God does not arrive in an earthquake. God does not arrive in a fire. The creator of all that is and was and is to come, is present in the gentle whisper.

God is in the gentle whisper. Though the wind rages, the earth shakes and fire scorches all we see, God will be there, close enough to whisper peace to our hearts.

As we continue to navigate this pandemic, may we remember the absolute tenderness and perpetual closeness of God. In all the chaos and fear, God is always close enough that we can hear a whisper. Together - let us continue and to pray to our faithful Whisperer:

God of silence and stillness, we trust you are with us. We pray for a Whisper of comfort, encouragement and hope. We struggle Grant us wisdom to accept learning ways as a community of faith. Draw close to those who are sick and all those who risk illness, caring for them, protecting and uplifting them.

In your name, we pray. Amen.

February Message for Lay and Rostered Leaders and Congregations

Dear friends and family in I Christ--

Earlier in the pandemic Bp. Larry drew us to the words of Ezra during the time of the Babylonian Exile. The books of Ezra and Nehemiah were written during a time of great transition The time of Babylonian exile had ended. Cyrus, the ruler of Persia, had begun to send the people home. And Ezra and Nehemiah were charged with the Herculean task of restoring Jerusalem and the great temple that had been sacked when Jerusalem fell.

For the most part, they were successful. The temple was rebuilt, although it wouldn't achieve its former splendor until the days of King Herod. But it was far from easy. The people doubted and struggled with the immensity of the task. They lost hope that they would see anything resembling what their ancestors once knew. Ezra and Nehemiah, along with some of the minor prophets such as Haggai, urged the people to the task, stressing the need for the temple to be rebuilt and for the people to return to what they once were. The laws, the rituals, the formula of life laid down in books such as Leviticus, had to become central for the people again. It was, after all, when the people had strayed from these actions and began to follow gods and other competing desires that things had gone badly. It was a message about returning to the roots of who the Israelites were. It was only by going back that they could go forward.

The interesting thing about the books of Ezra and Nehemiah is how they have paralleled something of our own journey during this time of pandemic. For long stretches, we were exiled from our houses of worship. We had no choice during those dark early months of the pandemic. No one had any vaccine protection. Herd immunity was a deadly pipe dream that we believed could never be achieved in a humane way. Slowly, we were allowed back, and it has been a rollercoaster ride ever since. Masks. No Masks. Capacity limits. No Capacity limits. Vaccine passports. A fourth wave. A fifth wave. We have been able to stay open this time around, but all with uncertainty lurking in the back of our minds. When will things change again? Will there come a time we have to close our doors? And what does our future look like? Has the pandemic damaged us beyond repair? We were already beginning to see the cracks in our foundation prior to Covid. Have the last 22 months broken the foundation altogether?

As we struggle with answering these questions, it can become very easy to do as Ezra and Nehemiah and Haggai, amongst other, tried to do. Go back to what we once knew. Go back to that point when things still made sense. The future is too uncertain. The only way we can go forward is to go back. It is a tempting route. I have longed more than once to go back to a time when things were more sensible, when I knew how to proceed. I look back and can't help but shed tears as I remember a world that once made sense. It wasn't perfect, but I knew what I could do to help make it better. Now? I don't know what to do and I definitely don't want to think about the future. I just want some certainty again, something of the past to reassert itself and ground this shifting, liminal time.

Ezra and Nehemiah tried to ground their people in those kinds of certainties. And it failed. Yes, for a few generations, they moved forward and were successful in rebuilding the temple. But it didn't truly last. By the time we encounter the narrative again, the Romans are the new power in the land, having swept away the last vestiges of Greek and other Eastern powers. Jerusalem is a vasal state of another great empire and the powers of Jerusalem are either in league with Rome or preaching a spiritualism based on a rigid adherence to the law, almost to the exclusion God. The promises of Ezra and Nehemiah had faded away in the truth that the past was now gone, and the people did not know the way forward.

As heartbreaking as it is to admit, it sounds eerily familiar. I wish it didn't. I look to the future, and I don't think that the past will meet us there. Those days are gone. And it breaks my heart. During this time, Christ's words from the Book of the prophet Isaiah

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me,
because he has anointed me
to bring good news to the poor.

He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives
and recovery of sight to the blind,
to let the oppressed go free,
to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."

He then goes on to say, in a rather final way, "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing." (Luke 4: 18-19, 21)

This short passage has Jesus making the statement that this ancient prophecy from Isaiah has come to pass in the hearing of all those in attendance. It seems oddly aggressive considering the context he finds himself in. No one was challenging him. No one said anything about who he was or about his mission. Yet his tone seems almost confrontational, as if he is challenging something greater, something beyond this moment that the Gospel is situated within. It is as if he is challenging an idea.

Where Ezra was attempting to give people hope by reading from the law, so Jesus is doing something of the same. But there is a difference. Where the push at the time of Ezra and Nehemiah was to go back to the days when Israel adhered to the law and was thriving, Jesus was issuing a different kind of hope. It was a hope based instead on something more ancient, more lasting, more enduring than the laws of Israel or of custom and tradition. Jesus was speaking to the only thing that could guide the people out of the uncertainty that they had felt for generations. It was what had bound them together as a community to begin with and what had emancipated them from Egypt's power. It was what gave them the hope of real grace in their life. It was, namely, God, moving in their midst, doing marvelous things, and drawing them after to walk as God's children. It was not ritual or tradition. Those were tools that helped them connect to God. They were not replacements for God.

The pharisees were the children of that line of thinking. They believed that ritual and tradition would lead to purity. Yet it was never truly so. The heart of the covenant was God's love for the people and the people's love for God. It was that love that would ground them but also propel them into new life.

Jesus was reminding them of this fact. And he was showing them that something new was indeed happening in their very midst. God, through Christ, had come to show them the truth that Moses and the prophets had never been able to fully demonstrate, as much as they had tried. Their hope was not in the past or tradition or in ritual. It was in God. The core of their faith was this God who would, as Jesus proclaims bring good news to the poor.

The way forward was never about going back. It was about going forward in all joy and peace in believing.

We resonate with the ancient Israelites of Ezra and Nehemiah. We are frightened and saddened and angry. We don't know the way forward as we long for the past. But Jesus comes into our midst, just as Jesus did in this text from Luke and reminds us again of the great and amazing beauty of God's love. No pandemic or exile can change that love. Tradition might come and tradition might go. But God's love endures forever. That love will lead us into a future unlike any we could have imagined. What is left for us to decide is whether we can accept that or whether we will cling to a past that can never be reclaimed. It isn't easy. The way forward will be terrifying, and we will be scared. But God is with us and God still has use for the church in this world. All we can do, we can truly do is trust in God's guidance, leaning on the one who has been active and present throughout the course of human history, inspiring the very best of who we are and what we can yet become.
