Progress

Wednesday June 28,2023



Regarding the building reconstruction: Insulating, vapor barrier, and drywalling are completed. Exterior security cameras have been installed and are operational; one interior camera is still to be installed. The system is monitored on cell phone and displayed in the Office Coordinator's office. Audio/ Visual (A/V) rough-in is completed. Prime and 1st coat painting in 5 rooms on the West side of the building is completed. Drywall sanding will soon be complete and the prime and 1st coat painting will continue.

New kitchen cabinets have been received. Furnaces have been installed and ductwork continues. Interior electrical work is happening. Repairing the subfloor is about to start.

AV equipment estimate has been approved by the Appraiser/ MBC; we wait for the approval of the estimate of the Fire Response System.

Value Master Builders (VMB) Progress Invoices to May 31, 2023, have been approved, funds received from Northbridge Insurance, and the invoice payment remitted to VMB. Lakeland Lutheran Church (LLC) continues to pay ½ of the GST on all invoicing.

There has been another break-in/ fire attempt at the new windows on the East side of the building. Your Reconstruction Building Committee recommended to LLC Council that the windows be removed and the area enclosed. One new triple pane window has been salvaged and stored for future use. The work provided to enclose the area was provided N/C by VMB. The new work to refinish this area of the exterior is not in the VMB Reconstruction Scope of Work and is now the responsibility of LLC. Estimates are being requested. Metal panelling in this area may be an alternative to stucco.


VMB has provided a Progress Invoice for the Changes and Additions approved by this congregation. The invoice for work completed to date has been paid with funds from the Capital Fund.

You are aware that this congregation has accepted a Global Settlement from Northbridge Insurance for Contents. Your Contents Coordinator, Cheryl B, Grant B, and Linda K and Lila W have travelled to Unity Lutheran Church (closing) in Medicine Hat to consider and accept the gifting of contents from their building/ church. These contents have been moved and are being stored here in Cold Lake. Moving forward, Cheryl B will meet with all committees to rework the selection and purchase of replacement items for our building/ church.

Slowly it is happening.

LLC will continue to rent our interim facility at Iron Horse Condos through July, August, and September and most likely October.

Dear Beloved of God -

In preparation for the Lutheran World Federation Assembly, September 2023, in Krakow, Poland, a pre-assembly for the Americas was held in April 2023, in Bogota, Colombia, under the LWF Assembly theme: "One Body, One Spirit, One Hope." (Ephesians 4:4)

I was invited to present on the third phrase of the Assembly theme, "One Hope." I began by recalling a gathering where Rev. Dr. Rafael Malpica Padilla shared a definition of faith and hope that has stayed with me: "Faith is the ability to listen to the melody of the future and hope is the courage to dance to its rhythm now."

With so many causes for despair we are still called to hope. On what do we base our hope? What is the melody of the future? How can we dance when the melody is faint, unfamiliar, or forgotten; and the melodies around us are not of promise or hope, but destruction, violence, and polarization?

We all know of the social, political, economic, and ecological marginalization happening globally, regionally, and locally. The COVID-19 pandemic further unmasked these injustices. Yet in the midst of these overwhelming realities, we are still called to witness, dance, and hope.

Paul's letter to the Ephesians insists on hope. Why?

- Hope is a gift of the Holy Spirit.
- Hope knows what God has done in Christ and sees it in everyday life.
- This hope is "eschatological" not yet fulfilled, but already active where faith moves us to renew the earth and to reform injustice. Luther's catechism teaches that this hope is expressed when we pray, "Your kingdom come. Your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven."
- Hope liberates from worldly powers and encourages us to forge ahead, united in purpose.
- Hope proclaims that in this broken world, God does not abandon us.

So how are we to dance to the melody of the future with courage? Rev. Dr. Gordon Jensen, retired professor from Lutheran Theological Seminary, Saskatoon, Canada, recently wrote: "When we experience the gospel, we and the church cannot help but be engaged in the transformation of lives and the transformation of society." (Jensen, Canada Lutheran vol. 38, no. 1 Jan/Feb 2023, p. 8)

The Spirit compels us to participate in God's work of establishing justice and making peace – to transformation – so that all may have abundant life.

Gifted and nurtured by the Spirit, hope is a vital component of our common mission through our worship, proclamation, diakonia, humanitarian work and advocacy in the public space, and through our ecumenical and interfaith commitment.

The late Vitor Westhelle wrote: "The theology of the cross ... [moves] into hopeful solidarity, the solidarity of those who are moved by the pain of God in the midst of the world, or by the pain of the world in the midst of God." (From Padilla, "Martin Luther for the Life of the Church," in The Forgotten Luther III, Minneapolis: Fortress Press, 2021, p 92)

In this hopeful solidarity we know that our dance will be changed – will be enriched and strengthened – and other dance steps will be learned, shared, taught. In this hopeful solidarity we recognize moving to a vocation of living and working together in ongoing reformation.

This is not a static reality, nor an end in itself: we live and work together to respond to God's call and to join God in God's mission in the world, supporting each other to witness vibrantly in our diverse contexts through diaconal service, and through advocacy for justice, peace, and reconciliation everywhere and always.

Padilla concluded his presentation in 2022 with these words: "The tools for the work [are]: faith, hope, and love. Faith, the ability to hear the melody of the future; hope, the courage to dance to its rhythm here and now; and love, a stubborn and unwavering commitment."

May we together have such faith, hope, and love.

Request from our Support Committee

Shingles

The shingles on the North side of the building roof have been inspected; original construction was 1999/2000. Shingles are brittle and breaking off; the valleys are in poor condition. The South side was already reshingled 3 or 4 years ago.



The Support and Maintenance Committee and LLC Council have determined that the re-shingling should be completed soonest. We have an estimate - \$15,441.47. We have instructed the contractor to proceed. Currently, the Long-Term Maintenance Fund holds \$12,400.41. Opps, we are a short - \$3000.00+.


